Mitigating Circumstances: Guidance for acceptable evidence to support a claim

This document is designed to give guidance when a University of Worcester student needs to submit evidence to help support a claim of mitigating circumstances.

This list is not exhaustive and it may be that other evidence is acceptable to support a claim.

It is the student's responsibility to obtain evidence to support the claim; the University will not obtain evidence on the student's behalf or reimburse any charges that a student may incur in obtaining the evidence. Incomplete claims, or <u>claims which are not supported</u> by evidence, will not be considered.

To be accepted evidence must be

- **Genuine** the claim will be rejected if it is found that any of the evidence submitted is false, forged or has been tampered with in any way
- Independent letters from relatives or friends are not accepted
- Written in English if the evidence was written in a language other than English an official translated copy must be supplied
- Dated; and on official, headed paper or have an official stamp or seal of the issuing authority

Acceptable Evidence

All claims must be supported by appropriate independent documentary evidence which is authentic and timely, photocopies are accepted.

- Medical Certificate (this must be obtained at the time of illness to be valid evidence)
- Letter from medical practitioner confirming the illness of the student or person which they have a caring responsibility for
- Letter from a counsellor
- Death certificate or Order of Service
- Birth certificate (only in certain cases)
- A signed and dated letter from a coroner, legal practitioner, police officer, court official, or other professional
- Hospital discharge summary (must detail the nature of the illness)
- Statements from University staff if they have witnessed the illness/incident (The student should still try to submit appropriate independent documentary evidence to support the claim)

Unacceptable Evidence

If a student does not consult a medical practitioner at the time of the illness, it is not acceptable for a student to attempt to obtain corroborative medical evidence at a later date.

A letter from a medical practitioner stating, for example, "the student informs me that he/she was unwell during...." will not be deemed acceptable supporting evidence.

- Letters of support from family members, friends or fellow students will not be accepted
- Handwritten evidence that isn't legible
- Evidence in another language other than English (it is the student's responsibility to ensure evidence is translated)
- Copies of prescriptions or photographs of medication

Are you waiting for evidence?

Students should not delay a claim whilst waiting for evidence. It is acceptable to submit a claim and state 'evidence to follow' however it is then the students' responsibility to provide evidence no later than a week after the deadline date.
