THB noted that last year Council wanted to make changes but had missed the deadline to do so. A councillor last year felt that the document did not account for mature or postgraduate students and, instead, focused on undergraduates.

Action 01: Include an introductory sentence in the Charter including explicit reference to both undergraduate and postgraduate students

KS explained that there are currently no PGR documents that specifically states expected contact hours for research students. She therefore suggested that the Charter could include clear rules for expected contact hours for research students. The Charter should also qualify the expectation of meetings. Council agreed that stating contact hours might be too detailed an item to include within the Charter. Instead of adding this onto the Charter, having structured and detailed documents for research students might be something that KS might want to lobby the University for. THB suggested arranging a preliminary meeting with EM, LC and KS to discuss the issue further.

Action 02: THB, EM and LC to meet with KS to discuss how they can move forward with the raised PGR issue.

Following the name change from StAR to Course Rep, Council agreed that the Charter would need to be edited to include the title Course Rep.

Action 03: THB to change 'StAR' to 'Course Rep' in the Charter

Action 04: THB to change the WSU logo on the Charter

Action 05: THB to remove the word 'endeavour' from the Charter Action 06: JH, EM and THB to meet to discuss the Student Charter by the beginning of the w/c 7<sup>th</sup> May to make the appropriate changes as suggested by Council. The amended document should then be sent to all councillors for approval.

7 Process for approval of Clubs and Societies over Summer

JH explained that unless Councillors are final year students, they would hold their position of Councillor until October 2018. He explained that Societies and Clubs would be approved electronically over Summer. Councillors were asked to keep an eye on their emails over the next few months as this is typically a popular time for applications for new Societies and Clubs.

	EM explained the key motions at the Conference. In the Priority Zone, motions included the Student Poverty Commission and motions around Student Finance.	



In the Education Zone, motions included tackling the Black Attainment Gap, high course costs and hidden costs, postgraduate tuition fees, funding, and the loans system. In the Welfare Zone, motions included mental health because, nationally, Universities want to put more funding into this. Other motions included single use plastics, refugees, and scholarships.

JH explained that Shakira was re-elected as NUS President with 50.9% of vote. JH explained that there were 1000 delegates in attendance but only 690 voted in the NUS President Election. Amatey was re-elected as NUS's Vice President (Higher Education) with 68% of the vote. Ali Milani was re-elected as NUS's Vice President (Union Development) with 59.3% of the vote. Crosson Tory was elected as NUS's Vice President (Welfare). Zamzam Ibrahim was elected as NUS's Vice President (Society and Citizenship).

EM also explained that students occupied the stage in protest as time constraints meant that motions on student sex work and abortion rights in Northern Ireland were not heard. Due to a high volume of procedural motions being put forward during the Welfare Zone, it left very little time to discuss real issues Higher Education and Further Education students were facing at their Institutions. In total, only 1 motion was passed for the Welfare Zone, and this was deemed unacceptable by a large number of students who occupied the stage in protest. It delayed conference floor time and, as a result, two of the election counts took place long after conference finished.

## 11 | Update on Events

#### 11.1 Varsity

The overall score for this year's Varsity was 14-13 to Gloucestershire. There were a few new events such as table tennis, climbing and athletics. JH ran the 'It Takes Balls To Talk' campaign during the Arena Day. This is a national campaign set up to try and encourage male athletes to discuss their mental health. It seemed to be successful in its aim to engage students, giving out 500 promotional cards and having 200 meaningful conversations with students.

#### 11.2 Celebration Week

The Union Awards will be taking place on the 22<sup>nd</sup> May and the Colours Ball will be taking place on 23<sup>rd</sup> May. Tickets for these two events will be going off sale on 11<sup>th</sup> May. Councillors were encouraged to inform students about these events.

## **Information Items**

## 13 NUS Poverty Commission

JH explained that 9 Students' Unions took part in forming NUS's research, including Worcester. The Poverty Commission will feed into the upcoming review of the funding of post 16 education. The report is detailed in its analysis and THB explained that it will form a key piece of evidence in the national effort to lobby for a more equitable funding system.

Action 07: JH to circulate the Poverty Commission report to Councillors and to send them the press release that NUS submitted for the report.

#### 14 New Academic Structure

EM explained a proposal for new University structure, to be implemented in the new academic year 2018/19 is currently out for consultation. Rather than being



divided into 7 Institutes, the proposal is to have 9 schools clustered into 3 colleges. In each school there will be a number of different departments. EM explained that schools will still very much work and function like the Institutes do now. The restructuring is part of the University's gradual drive to try and make things consistent across the University. EM added that consistency is something that the SU supports, especially in the Academic Rep System.

EM asked Councillors for their initial thoughts on the new academic structure. JW noted that the change will not really have any impact on students. Councillors were surprised that Psychology was no longer sitting under Health. LLP asked EM about what the restructuring would mean for Joint Honours students, and EM explained that he does not envisage it changing any more than it is now.

KS expressed concerns that Education now sits with Humanities and Arts as there seemed to be little relevance. KS also noted that rebranding the University to have 'school' and 'college' labels sounds as though the University is trying to match elite languages found in Universities such as Oxford or Durham. Therefore, because of the elite language, Worcester might not be as accessible to students in the future.

#### 15 Governance Review

JH explained that the SU is currently organising focus groups from different student demographic groups to feed into the governance review research. By September 2018, the SU are hoping to present Council with a proposal.

## 16 | Policy Booklet

Past policies, which have been approved by the SU, are currently listed on the SU website. Looking to the future, the SU would like to create a policy booklet that outlines past policies.

## 17 "Malebox" (AG)

AG explained that, as part of his dissertation, he conducted research into how men see themselves in a 'masculine' environment and the struggles that they might face whilst trying to fit into that 'masculine' stereotype. He explained that women would also experience pressures of University life and fitting into a gender stereotype. Therefore, he suggested implementing a Male Box / FeMale Box (playing on the word 'mailbox') in which a few mailboxes could be dotted around campuses. Students would be able to put notes into these boxes about any concerns that might lead to stress or poor mental health. A designated member of staff would look at the notes and get back to the student with advice.

Council noted that the student would want to know who will be reading their note and so the SU would need to ensure that they include a disclosure around this. For example, if the designated SU staff member could not give an answer, then the student should be disclosed to the fact that their note might be passed on to another member of staff with appropriate knowledge.
